Welcome My Neighbor Immigration in Minnesota LWV West Metro Alliance

Speakers: Allison Liuzzi, Research Scientist MN Compass Project, Wilder Foundation; Sarah Radosevich, Policy Research Analyst, MN Chamber of Commerce; Tony Mandujano & Livia Harjan, Global Golden Valley.

This event reviewed current information about immigrants in Minnesota, shared statistics about who, when and where immigrants came from and where they are now in the state, and offered a glimpse into two different immigrant experiences. MN has 7% of residents who are foreign-born, compared to 13% for the US. The largest group is from Asia (37%), followed by Latin America (28%), Africa (20%), Europe (12%). MN has more African immigrants than US generally. There are currently 240 unaccompanied children in MN. It costs an average of \$12,500 for deportation per person. Almost 9% of immigrants in MN are refugees compared to less than 2% for the US.

No Matter the Color, Make Your Paint Green

A fresh coat of paint does wonders. With a little planning, you can beautify your surroundings the “green” way. Here are a few tips for reducing, reusing and recycling paint.

Measure Twice, Buy Once Carefully measure the space to be painted and determine how many coats of paint are needed before purchasing paint. See the can label for information. Calculate how much paint to buy following the general guidelines of purchasing 1 gallon of paint for every 400 square feet. Ask your paint retailer for additional help. Check with your county's solid waste management office for reuse opportunities. Many have leftover paint, especially latex paint, available in their free product reuse area at household hazardous waste drop-off sites.

Kids Voting Update – League of Women Voters St. Louis Park

The League of Women Voters St. Louis Park presented the proposal to the St. Louis Park City Council on November 17, 2014. Eilsen Knisely reviewed the mission statement, the proposed starting date of Fall 2015 (which would be for City Council and School Board) and that Aquila and the Middle School would be the starting point. The Council received the proposal enthusiastically and offered to be supportive. They expressed their interest in supporting a candidate event at the schools.

NOTES FROM NOVEMBER STEERING COMMITTEE MEETING: Four new members were welcomed to the Steering Committee: Mayme Casey from Perspectives; Tarabi Jama, cultural liaison for the district; and Clarence Pollock and Olivia Tolzin from Aquila School.

Discussion began in regard to the precincts represented at Aquila. It is important that all students vote even if their parents vote in a polling place not at the school. Five different precincts are represented. The possibility of absentee ballots was suggested. The plan has been for grades kindergarten through five be included in the voting. Dorothy will investigate what other schools do about helping kindergarten students interpret the ballot. Concerns about including Kids Voting curriculum into the already crowded schedule were addressed. Kari will be working with teachers to plan what will be taught.

Aquila has a family event almost every month. In October there is a Bingo Night with flu shots, popcorn and lemonade as part of the evening. It is hoped that a forum will be added at which students can ask candidates for School Board and City Council questions they have composed.

Transportation and language are barriers that prevent some families from getting to the polls. League members were charged with the responsibility of providing transportation to families unable drive themselves. Sara said that there is a translation plan being constructed in the district. Spanish is the most frequent second language at the school, with Somali being the second.

The Middle School will be represented at the next meeting when we will discuss more fully how in-school voting will take place. A specific place may be established with classrooms rotating through or students may vote in their own classrooms at a specific time. It was felt that the procedure should mirror actual voting as much as possible.

The next Steering Committee will be on Monday, January 12th at 2:30.

LWVMN Positions

ELECTION LAWS

LWVMN Position: Support improvements in election laws regulating election procedures, voting and school district elections.

ALTERNATIVE VOTING SYSTEMS

LWVMN Position: Support the option to use Instant Runoff Voting to elect State or Local Officials in single seat elections; the continued use of the plurality voting system in our elections. [The LWVMN Board reserves the right to decide the appropriateness of legislation proposing to replace the plurality voting system with the Instant Runoff System at the state level.] Support the right of local governments and municipalities to choose Instant Runoff Voting for their own local elections. Voters need to understand how votes in an election are tabulated and how a candidate actually wins an election. If a change in elections systems occurs, LWVMN supports adequate voter education. LWVMN does not support Approval, Borda Count, or Condorcet as alternative voting systems. (2005)

ELECTION PROCESS: APPORTIONMENT

LWVMN Position: Support timely redistricting based substantially on population and affecting all state and local governmental bodies.

LWVMN Position: Support an incarcerated person's right to access the vote following incarceration. (2013)

CAMPAIGN FINANCE

LWVMN Position: Support improvements in election laws regulating campaign practices.

ORGANIZATION OF GOVERNMENT

LWVMN Position: Support improved structure and procedures for the Minnesota Legislature and executive branch; support of an improved process for amending the Minnesota Constitution; support timely redistricting based substantially on population and affecting all state and local government districts. Oppose unicameral state legislature.

INITIATIVE, REFERENDUM AND RECALL

LWVMN Position: Support the continuation of legislative initiative and compulsory voter referendum on constitutional amendments; oppose most forms of voter initiative and referendum on statutes; opposition to recall by voters of members of the Legislature and state constitutional officers; support strict procedural limits on any process of initiative, referendum or recall.

FINANCING STATE GOVERNMENT

LWVMN Position: Support a balanced and diversified revenue system that is equitable, competitive with other states, progressive and reliable. Support long-term financial management, projections and a budget reserve. (1995)

GOVERNMENT SPENDING

State Government Spending

LWVMN Positions

- I. Broad Goals: The League of Women Voters of Minnesota (LWVMN) believes long-term vision as well as immediate concerns should guide state spending decisions.
- II. Spending Priorities: PreK-12 (regular) education, Health Care, Environmental protection
- III. Criteria for Limiting Spending – cut special projects, expanding infrastructure, property tax relief to middle incomes, and other services except those serving the most needy citizens.
- IV. Efficiency -- LWVMN supports enhancing efficiency and cost effectiveness in the provision of quality government services.

JUDICIARY

LWVMN Position: Support a judicial system with the capacity to assure a speedy trial and equal justice for all.

SELECTION OF JUDGES

LWVMN Position: (a) Initial appointment of judgeship by the governor, who must choose from among a list of qualified candidates forwarded by a nominating commission. (b) End-of-term evaluation of the judge's performance by an evaluation commission, results to be made available to the public. (c) Retention election: voters choose to retain or not retain the judge. (2008)

CORRECTIONS

LWVMN Position: Support a correctional system responsive to the needs of the individual offender and of society. Support sentencing decisions based on circumstances in relation to the crime, the offender and the effect on public safety, made by the judge within legislative guidelines. Support the abolition of the death penalty and oppose its reinstatement in Minnesota.

NATURAL RESOURCES

AIR QUALITY

LWVMN Position: Support measures to reduce air pollution from vehicular and stationary sources.

TRANSPORTATION

LWVMN – Government Spending: support maintaining "a viable statewide transportation system, including public transit".

LAND USE

LWVMN Position: Support an overall land use plan with maximum cooperation and implementation at the regional and local level, with state help in developing and exercising land use management, with opportunity for maximum local decision making, and with regional planning and regulation for matters of more than local concern.

WATER RESOURCES

LWVMN Position: Support a state role in the preservation and management of Minnesota's water resources through protection, allocation, conservation, pricing and interbasin transfer policies protective of Minnesota's current and future needs. (1985)

GREAT LAKES ECOSYSTEM

LWVMN Position: Supports preserving and enhancing the environmental integrity and quality of the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence River Ecosystem. We support the attainment and maintenance of high water quality standards throughout the Great Lakes Basin, with emphasis on water pollution prevention. Water conservation should be a high priority of all governments in the Basin. (2013)

SOLID WASTE

LWVMN Position: Support measures to reduce generation of solid waste and ensure safe treatment, storage and disposal of all wastes.

AGRICULTURE

LWVMN Position: Support a system of sustainable agricultural production which provides safe, healthful food and which preserves and protects the state's human and natural agricultural resources and enhances the environment; research and technical assistance in farming practices and rural economies that improve the economic viability of family farms, environmental health, and the quality of life of family farmers and their communities.

SOCIAL POLICY**EQUAL OPPORTUNITY**

LWVMN Position: Support policies to ensure equality of opportunity in employment, real property, public accommodations, education and other public services for all persons. Support administrative enforcement of antidiscrimination laws. Support state responsibility for and responsiveness to American Indian citizens.

HOUSING

LWVMN Position: All people have a right to housing. The public and private sectors should work together to ensure that everyone has access to adequate, decent, affordable housing.

CHILD HEALTH

LWVMN Position: Support access to comprehensive pre-natal and child health care. (1987)

TEENAGE PREGNANCY

LWVMN Position: Support prevention efforts to lower the rate of teenage pregnancy. (1988)

ALCOHOL AND TOBACCO USE

LWVMN Position: LWVMN supports educational programs that advance improved chemical health.

MENTAL HEALTH

LWVMN Position: Support a comprehensive and coordinated system of programs and services for mentally ill adults and emotionally disturbed children and adolescents. Priority should be given to persons with serious and persistent mental illness and/or acute mental illness. Minnesota public policy and funding should sustain an array of community based services which are available and accessible to persons with mental illness. Administration of that policy should provide clients with appropriate and adequate services. (1989)

CHILD CARE

LWVMN Position: Support coordinated public policies and funding to ensure safe, affordable, quality child care throughout the state. (1987)

PREVENTION OF VIOLENCE

LWVMN Position: Support violence prevention programs in our community. (1994)

FAMILY VIOLENCE

LWVMN Position: Support improved procedures for agencies dealing with family violence. Support improved services for the victims.

CHILD SUPPORT

LWVMN Position: Support stricter enforcement of court-ordered child support payments.

CHILD PROTECTION

LWVMN Position: Support adequate staffing and resources for child protection services. (1986)

IMMIGRATION

LWVMN Position: Support incorporating immigrants into our communities by providing access to education, by endorsing the development of secure identification documents, and by respecting the right of law enforcement personnel to perform their duties without the burden of interpreting federal immigration policies. Oppose residents with legal immigrant status running for local office.

FIREARMS

LWVMN Position: Support restrictions on the sale, possession and use of firearms by private parties in the state of Minnesota. (1990)

EDUCATION EQUAL OPPORTUNITY

LWVMN Position: Support increased state responsibility in creating equal public educational opportunities for all Minnesota children through measures to correct racial imbalance. Support equal access to education, employment and housing.

LWVMN Position: Support policies to ensure equal opportunity in employment, real property, public accommodations, education and other public services for all persons.

FINANCING OF EDUCATION

LWVMN Position: All Minnesota children should have equal access to a good public education. State funding for education should be at a level that makes programs of comparable substance and quality available to all. A student's access to a good education should not depend on the wealth of his or her school district.

COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AND TENURE

LWVMN Position: Support improvements in the collective bargaining and tenure laws of the state as they apply to K-12 teachers only.

LIBRARY FUNDING

LWVMN Position: Support for increased and restructured funding for public libraries.

COUNCIL OF METROPOLITAN AREA LEAGUES POSITIONS**METROPOLITAN COUNCIL**

CMAL Position: Support the development of the Metropolitan Council as the decision-making body for metropolitan needs in accordance with these criteria: efficiency and economy, equitable financing, flexibility, citizen control and responsiveness to the electorate. CMAL supports provisions for coordinated metropolitan services focused through the Metropolitan Council. CMAL supports retention of an appointed Metropolitan Council with greater use of its existing powers. (1969, 1976, 1993)

HOUSING

CMAL Position: Support the Metropolitan Council as the Housing and Redevelopment Authority acting as an administrative agency providing technical assistance to communities requesting service. CMAL opposes an independent regional body separate from the Council to own and operate subsidized housing. (1981)

HEALTH

CMAL Position: Support the continuation of health planning and coordination at the metropolitan level with state and/or regional funds, if federal funds are reduced. (1981).

FUNDING/FINANCING FISCAL DISPARITIES

CMAL Position: Support area-wide sharing of fiscal resources, to move toward the solution of problems created by fiscal disparities and to finance services which benefit the Twin Cities Metropolitan Area as a whole or affect the lives of all its citizens. (1970) The integrity of the area-wide pool used in the sharing of fiscal resources should be maintained with no exceptions. (1997) Loans from the pool should be discouraged and if made should not be forgiven. (1997)

FINANCING METROPOLITAN SERVICES

CMAL Position: Support operating and maintaining the metropolitan systems and services with a mix of funding sources specific to each service (federal, state and local funds and user fees). If a supplemental fund is created, CMAL supports additional user fees, new or increased, appropriate to the service. (1985)

SCHOOL INTEGRATION/DESEGREGATION

CMAL Position: Support the following measures to achieve school integration/desegregation in the metropolitan area: mandatory participation by the school districts; voluntary participation by students; combination of student exchanges, magnets and incentives; combination of incentive plans for school districts and individuals funded by state money; redrawing of school district lines (as necessary). (1991)

HOUSING/HEALTH CARE FOR THE AGING

CMAL Position: Support local planning for the housing and service needs for the elderly and disabled in the community. Support the preparation of a local "Blueprint for Action." (1989)

LAND USE AND ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY

CMAL Position: CMAL recognizes that increased pressures for development in the entire Twin Cities area indicate the need for a strong public voice in land-use decisions. CMAL supports metropolitan-level planning, programs and policies directed toward channeling development in ways that will: (1) preserve and enhance the natural environment; (2) use public investment to the best advantage; and (3) provide area residents with diversity in choice of facilities and amenities. (1972)

ENVIRONMENT

CMAL Position: Support a requirement that local governments adopt implementation ordinances for protection of environmental quality for review and approval by the Metropolitan Council. (1981)

CMAL Position: Support the Metropolitan Council as the agency to plan and coordinate the water supply needs of the region. (1995)

SOLID WASTE

CMAL Position: Support the establishment by the Metropolitan Council of a system for controlling the flow of solid waste for recycling and resource recovery. (1981)

TRANSPORTATION

CMAL Position: Support the Metropolitan Council as the single metropolitan agency planning and coordinating a diverse transportation system, meeting varied needs, and having approval authority over this system's major capital expenditures. New funding sources should be service related. (1983)

COUNTY GOVERNMENT

CMAL Position: Support measures to ensure accountability and visibility of county government. Support measures to improve cooperation and communication between the Metropolitan Council and county government within the metropolitan area. (1975)

PROPOSED LWVSLP PROGRAM FOR 2013-2014

GOVERNMENT

Diversity

- Support the city of St. Louis Park in developing a long-range plan for hiring and promoting qualified persons of diversity at all levels of city government services. (1993)
- Support St. Louis Park elected officials, civic groups and community leaders in collaborating to develop a long range plan for the city to use in solving problems related to communication between diverse groups, public safety, racism, violence, and maintaining neighborhoods. (1993)

Initiative and Referendum

- Support of the continuation of legislative initiative and compulsory voter referendum on constitutional amendment; opposition to most forms of voter initiative and referendum on statutes.
- Opposition to recall by voters of members of the Legislature and state constitutional officers.
- Support of strict procedural limits on any process of initiative.

Support of:

1. The continued initiation of constitutional amendments by the legislative branch; opposition to all forms of voter initiative of such amendments (direct, indirect or advisory).
2. The continuation of compulsory voter referendum on constitutional amendments.
3. Strict procedural limits on any form of initiative, referendum or recall considered or adopted in Minnesota, including restrictions on:
 - a. Time span for collecting signatures.
 - b. Eligibility requirements for persons signing and collecting petitions.
 - c. Percentage of signatures required, geographic distribution of signers, and verification of signatures.
 - d. Size of vote required for passage.
 - e. Procedure for repeal or amendment of a successful initiative or referendum.
 - f. Contributions to and spending for ballot issue campaigns.

Opposition to:

1. Direct initiative and advisory initiative on statutes, no agreement on indirect initiative on statutes.
2. Optional and compulsory referendum on statutes; no agreement on petition referendum statutes.
3. Voter recall of members of the Legislature and state constitutional officers; no agreement on voter recall of judges or appointed officials. (2002)

EDUCATION

ESL Programs

- Support the ESL (English as a Second Language) program. Support additional funding for the ESL program. Support increases in the following if additional funding becomes available: Books, workbooks, reference materials, computer discs, teachers, and paraprofessionals. Support adequate space for the ESL program. The League does not support cutbacks in the funding for the ESL program. (1990)

Diversity

- Support St. Louis Park School District 283 in being pro-active in working to ensure that students and school personnel understand the increasing diversity of the students. (1993)
- Support the teaching of history, culture, literature and arts of African-Americans, Asian Americans, Hispanic-Americans and Native-Americans on an ongoing and comprehensive basis. (1993).
- Support the development of a long range, pro-active plan to hire qualified persons of diversity, and that it uses the assistance of its present minority personnel in doing this. (1993)

NATURAL RESOURCES

Recycling

- Support the expansion of recycling of solid waste, including plastics. (1987).
- Support policies that promote and protect environmental quality. (1973) (1979).

SOCIAL POLICY

Domestic Abuse

- Support mandatory arrest of the offender as part of the stated policy and guidelines that police must follow. (1988)
- Support the handling of domestic abuse cases in criminal court. (1988)
- Support an intervention/advocacy program in St. Louis Park. (1988)
- Support funding advocacy/intervention programs through a combination of private & public funds. (1988)

Prevention of Violence

Support for violence prevention programs in our community.

1. Educational programs that emphasize self-esteem, healthy sexuality, problem solving, positive expression of emotions, nonviolent conflict resolution, and respect for others to prevent violent behavior. This would include support for:
 - a. Government-sponsored parenting and early childhood classes.
 - b. Local or state government mandating or encouraging such education programs in school curricula.
 - c. Use of public money to train teachers and administrators to use nonviolence curricula.
 - d. Training for childcare providers.
2. A requirement that adult educators, including coaches, participate in prevention of sexual harassment and violence education programs and that public money is provided for adequate training.
3. The use of public money for a stateside public information and communication campaign designed to prevent violent and sexually violent behavior; i.e. to promote healthy sexuality, nonviolent conflict resolution, and gender and race equality.
4. Efforts by state and local government to develop and coordinate programs dealing with primary prevention of violence.
5. Allocation of public monies in governmental programs to combat violence through reducing substance abuse and poverty, and by identifying and responding to individuals who have been violent or are at risk for violent behavior.
6. The following social institutions taking an active role in preventing violent behavior:
 - a. Religious community
 - b. Business community
 - c. Legal community
 - d. Medical community
 - e. Media, civic and recreation community
7. Efforts to encourage the media industry to exercise self-restraint in the promotion of violence.
8. Efforts to encourage the pornography industry to exercise self-restraint in the promotion of sexually violent pornography. (1991).

Family Services

- Support a one-stop-shop office for coordinating family services. (1995)

St. Louis Park City Council November 3, 2014 Aggie Leitheiser, reporter

All members were present. Acceptance of a donation from the Kiwanis to Westwood Hills.

Public Hearings on Special Service Districts 1 through 6 which continues current services, primarily more snow plowing. Public Hearing on Groves Academy Revenue Bonds of \$5.6 million. This is a project with the city of Mayor that will act as bond sales as they have capacity for bonding. State law allows cities to support each other in this way. No liability for SLP.

Resolution approved for \$10 million in General Obligation Bonds for sidewalks, trails and utilities. “ This continues the “Connect the Park” initiative. There will be no increase in the levy rate as it is already built in.

First reading of ownership of water lines with 2nd reading at the next meeting. This would change ownership of the water line from curb to main from the homeowner to the city, as is the case in most other cities. No impact on utility rates. The change would be effective January 1, 2015.
